ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2017

- Formally created the Birmingham Historical Society Endowment Fund and transferred \$1.3 million to the fund that will help support the Society's educational programs in future years.
- Continued to build our digital collection with the Alabama Department of Archives and History online Digital Library.
- Conducted the Annual Meeting and feted Frances Robb's *Shot in Alabama—A History of Photography, 1839-1941* and tasted members' Heirloom Cakes.
- Hosted the annual Heritage Society Gathering at the Crawford Johnson Residence, the recently restored home of Maye and Bernard Frei.
- Photographed Shades Creek from the springs where it originates to its confluence with the Cahaba River, and researched historical happenings.
- Almost completed Historic American Engineering Record documentation of the Ross Creek Culvert, built late 1863 as part of the Confederate government's development of industrial infrastructure in Shades Valley and today the centerpiece of the Ross Bridge community.
- Researched and prepared a newsletter on the history of the Sloss Quarters from the opening of the furnaces in the 1880s to today's recreation.
- Hosted Robin Karson, editor of *Warren H. Manning—Landscape Architect and Environmental Planner* (the 2017 Members' book) at a public lecture.
- Continued to grow Grandmother's Garden using heirloom plants and practices. Saturday Walks and Talks featured historical and medicinal plant use, and Alabama Plein Air Artists painted in the garden.
- Celebrated the Society's 75th Anniversary with a gathering at the Birmingham Printing Company Buildings, now home to ArchitectureWorks.

FOUNDING THE SOCIETY 1942

CITY HISTORICAL SOCIETY FORMED

Group Plans To Gather First-Hand Data For Archives

Birmingham's first historical society was organized this week at a meeting in the Public Library, at which time temporary officers were elected and plans made for drawing up a constitution and by-laws.

John C. Henley, Jr., presiding as temporary president, said the purpose of the society would be to preserve material objects pertaining to the history of Birmingham and to encourage a wide study of both city and county.

Henley pointed out that Birmingham, whose claim to being the youngest city in America for its size, was recently verified by officials of the U. S. Census Bureau, is unique, in that several citizens can recall the actual founding of the town, whose 71st birthday fell on the 19th day of December.

"This indicates," he said, "that we still have time, and the splendid opportunity, to preserve historical facts in their fullest accuracy, instead of allowing them to become forever garbled by the passing of time and the day when base sources of information will have disappeared."

Preserving Our History

Birmingham shows signs of maturing. It has become conscious of its history. More important, it has become conscious that history can be preserved only in records, and that unless some person or some group makes a point of preserving the records, history is lost, or distorted.

The organization of the Birmingham Historical Society is evidence of the city's maturity. It grows out of a realization that the time has come to compile and record the facts of the city's early life before it is too late. There are still a few pioneers in the city, persons whose lives go back to the 1870s when Birmingham was but a sprawling and quarreling mining town. Their assistance in compiling records of the city's early history will be valuable and should be utilized now.

It is good to note, however, that the society, even though its work deals with the past, has a forward look. History is of value to man only when it enriches his understanding of the present or points the way to a better future. The Birmingham Historical Society proposes to make its work valuable now and in the future by assuming such tasks as marking historic sites around the city and by preserving material objects for later study.

Let a word of commendation be said, also, for the Birmingham Public Library, which sponsored the organization of the society. A great library, it has been said, contains the diary of the human race. The Birmingham Public Library should at least house the diary of Birmingham.
